 Jane is seeking counseling due to reported, "anger outbursts." She states that she becomes so angry with her husband that she thinks of physically harming him, although she does not

She denies any physical violence but has gone as far as grabbing a knife and threatening him. She does respond to his verbal attempts to calm her. She reports feeling relief after the "explosion." Jane does admit that she is fearful that her husband will leave her due to her behavior. She reports that they do not communicate well, he maintains the house, and they rarely experience intimacy or sex. Jane has an MBA and is very intelligent. She also discusses feeling depressed most of the time, but she has to put on a "game face" to do her work.

Mary, a 50-year-old female, referred herself for therapy due to anxiety, phobic, and depressive symptoms. Mary was afraid to leave her home because of fears of having a panic attack. She reported experiencing more than 10 attacks in the past month. These attacks were increasing in intensity. During his intake session, she indicated that panic attacks trigger fears that she's having a heart attack. Mary's father died of a massive heart attack at age 55. Mary's health was excellent. She had been rushed to the emergency room during two recent panic episodes. In both cases Mary's cardiac functioning was evaluated and found to be within normal limits. Nonetheless, her fear of panic attacks and heart attacks was escalating, and her increasing seclusion was adversely affecting her employment as a professor at a local vocational college. Her husband, Brian, accompanied her to her intake session. At the time of the referral, Mary had stopped driving and was having her husband transport her. Mary's symptoms were consistent with panic disorder with agoraphobia.
